DESCRIPTION

The residence is a single story wooden design on a rectangular plan in an Italianate style. The residence has two front bay windows, and a projecting pediment over the entrance supported by classic columns and balustrades. Enclosed eaves with brackets, vertical segmental arched windows and quoins along the corners add Italianate detailing. Prior to World War II, there was metal decorative cresting the central roof area. This was removed for scrap iron during the war. The nine concrete step straight stairway with metal pipe handrailing is an alteration. A full basement sets the site apart from the majority of other structures in the neighborhood. The residence is sheathed in wide shiplap with wooden panels above and below the double hung bay windows. Dentils and a plain frieze further define the exterior design. Composition shingles sheath the roof which is multi-planar in form. The massive double door entry with segmental arched transom is particularly impressive. The structure is in somewhat deteriorated condition as is the mature landscape. Without question, however, this site is one of Gilrov's finest Italianate victorians.

| This house was built for Milton Holsclaw in 1874. Mr. Holsclaw was from Howard Co., Missouri, and came to California with two bothers in 1849. They worked in the Diamond Springs Gold Mine and later Milton started freighting in Sacramento, Grass valley, Yuba City and Placerville. Finally, he came to Gilroy in 1851 with his brother James. There were instumental in the start of a protestant church, also started the first blacksmith shop and later raised wheat, barley and moved on to a farm. He married Mary Ann zuck in 1855. She was the daughter of David Zuck, of Zuck, Rogers, and Hoover Real Estate Group. Holsclaw then purchased, lived in and sold several farms and city properties during the60 and 70;s. He lived in this house for only about one year before he purchased and moved to a farm on what was to become Holsclaw Road where the family lived for the remainder of their life. Both daughters graduated from Stanford in 1896. Florence became a medical doctor, as well as a professor of pediatric medicine at both Stanford and University of California Medical Schools. Grace taught for 38 years in Public Schools. Mr. Holsclaw sold the house to George Hersey, who came to California from Massachusetts in 1876. He was a cashier, and Director of the Bank of gilroy. Following his death from cholera, Mary Hersey, his wido continued to live in the house until her death. It was in the estate until 1911.
